Overview of Clinical Skills in Addiction Medicine for Primary Care Providers

MARCH 21-22, 2025

UCI School of Medicine

Course Description

This two-day conference for primary care and other health providers will integrate recent scienti ic data with current clinical practice regarding the assessment, diagnosis and treatment of substance use disorders. Topics will also include management of pain-related conditions, collaborative care, and other considerations in order to promote the development of SUD treatment in a primary care setting.

Target Audience

Primary care physicians and allied health professionals interested in addiction medicine.

Educational Needs

Primary care providers deliver the most behavioral health care, although many have not been trained to treat addiction. While guidelines for treatment of common substance use disorders within the primary care exist, many providers are uncomfortable implementing them due to perceptions of risk and stigma.

At the conclusion of this activity, the participant should be able to:

- Effectively screen for substance misuse
- Utilize motivational interviewing to assess readiness for change and move patients along the continuum of change behavior
- Identify evidence-based treatments available in primary care settings for substance use disorders including stimulant, opioid, and sedative/hypnotic use disorders.
- Develop/adapt new models of care to integrate substance use treatment into primary care settings
- Understand referral options and how to utilize community recovery supports level of care placement based on American Society of Addiction Medicine Criteria
- Understand the importance of addressing other psychiatric disorders in patients with substance use disorders
- Effectively utilize buprenorphine for chronic pain and opioid use disorder
- Manage common pain conditions with non-opioid therapies

Robert McCarron, DO

Founding Director, Train New Trainers Primary Care - Training and Education in Addiction Medicine Fellowship

Robert McCarron, D.O. completed a dual residency in internal medicine and psychiatry at Rush University and received board certification in psychiatry, psychosomatic medicine and internal medicine. While on faculty at the University of California, Davis and Irvine Schools of Medicine, he started the only two California based combined internal medicine / psychiatry residency programs. In these roles, he received grant support to create and implement a "Med Psych" curriculum that can be used in the public mental health system by psychiatry residency training programs. Dr. McCarron served as Director of the only Sacramento County Crisis Stabilization Unit and started the Pain Psychiatry Clinic and Med/Psych Clinic, within the UC Davis Division of Pain Medicine and Internal Medicine, respectively. Dr. McCarron is the Founding Director for the UC Davis Train New Trainers (TNT) Primary Care Psychiatry (PCP) Fellowship, which is a one-year program designed to train primary care providers in the essentials of psychiatry and pediatric behavioral health. Dr. McCarron now serves as Professor, Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Medicine and Assistant Dean, Continuing Medical Education at the University of California, Irvine School of Medicine. He is also Director of Education for the UCI Susan Samueli Integrative Health Institute. He serves on the ACGME Residency Review Committee for Psychiatry and is Medical Director for Mind OC. Dr. McCarron is a California National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) Board Member.



Justine Welsh, MD

Co-Associate Director, Train New Trainers Primary Care Training and Education in Addiction Medicine Fellowship

Dr. Welsh is a triple boarded child/adolescent and adult addiction psychiatrist, and an Associate Professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at Emory University School of Medicine. She is the founder and Director of the Emory Healthcare Addiction Services and the Medical Director of the Addiction Alliance of Georgia, a collaboration between Emory University and the Hazelden Betty Ford Foundation. Dr. Welsh's research has focused on accessing evidence-based treatment for adolescents and young adults with substance use disorders. She has been the recipient of award and grant funding from agencies including NIDA, NIAAA, and AACAP. Her co-edited book, Treating Adolescent Substance Use: A Clinician's Guide, was released in 2019. Dr. Welsh is an active advocate for enhancing access to quality comprehensive treatment for individuals with substance use disorders. She recently served as a board member of the Georgia Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Disabilities, and currently co-chairs the Public Policy Committee for the American Academy of Addiction Psychiatry. Dr. Welsh also provides expert consultation on reducing addiction-related stigma and enhancing medical education in the CDC's Division of Overdose Prevention.



Stephen Delisi, MD

Co-Associate Director, Train New Trainers Primary Care Training and Education in Addiction Medicine Fellowship

Dr. Delisi is board certified by both the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology and the American Board of Addiction Medicine. Before joining the YourPath team as CMO and President, Dr, Delisi had served as a psychiatrist for the Hazelden Betty Ford Foundation from 2005-2023. During his time with Hazelden, Dr. Delisi most recently served as Medical Director, Enterprise Solutions. Prior to that role, he also served as Medical Director of Professional Education, Assistant Dean of the Hazelden Betty Ford Graduate School of Addiction Studies, and Midwest Regional Medical Director for Recovery Services at Hazelden Betty Ford. Dr. Delisi continues as an Adjunct Faculty member of the Hazelden Betty Ford Graduate School. Prior to joining Hazelden Betty Ford, he held positions as Director of Psychiatric Services at Rush Behavioral Health-DuPage and Associate Director of the Psychiatric Residency Program at Rush University Medical Center. Dr. Delisi is a nationally recognized leader, speaker, and consultant on the use of evidence-based, integrated treatments for co-occurring and substance use disorders, as well as the risk conferred by the epigenetic effects of Adverse Childhood Experiences and trauma.
